Great Industry Links

The University is recognised as setting a blueprint for excellence in industry engagement through its pioneering approach to working with employers. Our relationships with companies such as Siemens,

Santander, and *The Guardian* demonstrate our innovative, industry-engaged approach. This has been acknowledged through a series of national awards and accolades, including a Lord Stafford Award (2011) and a Times Higher Education Award (2012).

Lincoln graduates have gone on to secure jobs at major companies and organisations around the world, including the BBC, Rolls-Royce, Siemens, Boots, GlaxoSmithKline, Lloyds Bank, and Rockstar Games.

Study Abroad

Alongside opportunities to study for a full degree or postgraduate degree programme, the University of Lincoln offers a range of short study options for students from around the world.

As part of our Study Abroad scheme, students can study a range of University of Lincoln programmes for either one semester, or one full academic

year. There may also be Erasmus+ opportunities across the EU, subject to the availability of the scheme.

Support Services

The University offers a range of support and advice services to help you during your time in Lincoln in both academic and personal matters. Every student can access the University's Student Support Centre and is allocated a personal tutor to provide mentoring, guidance, and encouragement to enable them to get the most out of their university experience.

The Student Wellbeing Centre offers confidential support, advice, and guidance on issues that may affect your study. A Multi-Faith Chaplaincy connects the University with local faith communities, including churches and a new mosque. The University of Lincoln Health Service is also based on campus.

Discover Lincoln

One of the world's great historic cities, Lincoln is renowned for its fusion of old and new. Lincolnshire is the birthplace of renowned physicist and mathematician Sir Isaac Newton, and the UK's first female Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher. More recently the city of Lincoln has featured in *Downton Abbey* and *The Da Vinci Code*.

Lincoln's Roman and medieval heritage blends together seamlessly with modern city living, and the University's main campus is situated in the heart of it all on the spectacular Brayford Pool waterfront.

Within walking distance of the University is a range of restaurants, cafes, and bars overlooking the marina area, while the city's high street is just a short walk away, offering a mix of independent stores and national brands and chains.

The city's famous Steep Hill – a beautiful cobbled street lined with boutique shops and tearooms – provides the gateway to the city's historic Cathedral Quarter and Bailgate area where independent shops and cafes nestle between the walls of the medieval Lincoln Castle and the grandeur of Lincoln Cathedral.

Thousands of tourists flock to the city each year to visit the Castle, which is home to one of only four surviving originals of the 1215 Magna Carta and the only place in the world this landmark document – sometimes called the foundation of democracy – can be seen side-by-side with the related Charter of the Forest.

Watching over the city, Lincoln Cathedral is one of Europe's most celebrated medieval buildings, providing the stunning setting for the University's graduation ceremonies.

University life is about so much more than studying, and the city of Lincoln and wider county has plenty for you outside of your studies. As an example, Sir Isaac Newton's house and apple tree are available to visit in Woolsthorpe-by-Colsterworth, near Grantham. There's lots to discover in the city and beyond.





Discover Food and Drink

Sampling the county's tempting local food is a must, from the famous Lincolnshire sausage to delicious cheeses and homemade plum bread. Lincoln is home to a variety of restaurants and cafés which specialise in cuisine from around the world. Examples include Chinese, Korean, Spanish, Greek and Mexican. There are also a variety of oriental and European food stores and a halal butcher. There is a regular farmers' market in the city centre, providing the ideal opportunity to pick up some regional favourites, and you'll also discover a range of pop-up restaurants, food vans, and food festivals throughout the year. Don't miss the city's famous Christmas Market in December.

Discover Lincoln's Nightlife

From quirky speakeasy bars to cosy pubs, stylish independent cafes to bustling live music venues and club nights, Lincoln offers a vibrant and varied nightlife. One of the biggest venues in Lincoln is The Engine Shed, which has played host to big name acts such as Kasabian, Kaiser Chiefs, Kings of Leon, and Rudimental. The city's Odeon cinema is located conveniently close to campus.

Discover Lincoln's Arts and Culture

Lincoln boasts a wide range of museums and public art galleries, giving visitors the chance to explore and experience both local and national culture. There is a lively programme of theatre events in the city's New Theatre Royal,

Drill Hall, and Lincoln Performing Arts Centre, and a variety of festivals are hosted in the city, including the Frequency Festival of Digital Culture, Lincoln Book Festival, and the Indie-Lincs international film festival.

Discover the Lincolnshire Countryside

The city is surrounded by beautiful countryside, ready to be explored through country walks and cycle routes. You can find quaint market towns, stunning scenery, and fascinating heritage. A visit to one of Lincolnshire's seaside resorts is a great way to spend a sunny day with friends.

How to Get Here

The University of Lincoln's Brayford Pool Campus is a short walk from Lincoln Central railway station. From here, there are regular train links to a number of major cities and towns across the UK including Leicester, Nottingham, Sheffield, Hull and Leeds.

Train travel to the centre of London typically takes around two hours although journey times can vary depending on the time of day. If you would like to fly into a regional airport which is close to Lincoln then you can choose Humberside Airport or East Midlands Airport. These airports have international connections through European airports such as Amsterdam, Paris, or Frankfurt. The University also runs a free airport pick-up service for students arriving into London Heathrow Airport on selected dates.



Home from Home

Lincoln was placed 5th in the UK (out of 128 universities) for lowest cost of accommodation rooms in The Times and Sunday Times Good University Guide 2019.



Based in the heart of Lincoln's city centre, most student accommodation at the University is either on our Brayford Pool Campus or just a short distance away. In fact, more than three quarters of our students travel into campus on foot, one of the highest ratios of any university in the country (Student Travel Survey 2016, as reported by HESA).

There are a variety of options available, depending on your needs and budget. Many students spend their first year in university managed accommodation, before moving into private accommodation in their second and third years.

Our Accommodation Services team is on hand to help you find a great place to live.

On-campus Accommodation

The Student Village comprises the University's on-campus accommodation and is made up of two purpose-built waterfront complexes: Lincoln Courts and the University's latest on-campus residential development, Cygnet Wharf.

Both developments place students close to the University's academic buildings, Student Services, and Students' Union, while the city's High Street is a short walk away. The buildings are made up of furnished self-catering apartments

which house between three and eight students, and most of these include bedrooms with en-suite facilities. Rental costs for these complexes include utilities, personal possessions insurance, and WiFi internet access. The Student Village is owned and managed by the University and our dedicated Accommodation Services team is there to help you make the most of your experience. As well as 24-hour on-campus security, students can also make use of the launderette and bicycle storage.

Off-campus University Accommodation

In addition to our on-campus accommodation, the University manages a range of halls of residence for new and continuing students who choose to live off-campus. They are all within a short walk of the campus and, as they are owned by the University, students receive the same type of support that they would

benefit from in on-campus accommodation.

Partnership Halls

Accommodation is available in Partnership Halls and the University works closely with our partners to ensure that the high standards we expect are met within their residences. There are halls of residence and private rentals to suit a range of budgets, and many of the properties offer en-suite rooms.

Private Rentals

The University is part of the city-wide Lincoln Student Housing Accreditation Scheme covering private rented housing. Students who would prefer to find their own accommodation through private rentals can find out more about house shares in the city by contacting us or by using the Studentpad website at www.lincolnstudentpad.co.uk/accommodation.

The online application system for accommodation opens on 1 March 2020 – you don't have to wait for your exam results to apply.

Get Involved

There are lots of ways for you to get involved with your Students' Union. From becoming a Course Representative to taking part in sports and societies, there is something for everyone. The Students' Union's unique Campaigns Network also provides an excellent platform to meet new people while fundraising for, championing and supporting local and national good causes.

Sports and Societies

As a University of Lincoln student, you will have the opportunity to get involved in a range of sports clubs, academic societies and Students' Union societies. Activities include everything from the Harry Potter Society to the

Photography Society, badminton and dance.

If you love sport but don't want to play competitively, you can try the Students' Union's Social Sport sessions. These sessions are completely free for sports and societies members and no experience, equipment or commitment is required. Just come along to as many of the sessions as you would like to maintain a healthy body and healthy mind.

Advice Centre

Situated across from the University Library, the Students' Union Advice Centre offers free, professional, independent and impartial advice across a range of issues including academic, financial, housing and welfare.

Employability

Lincoln Students' Union has a number of services and programmes designed to help make you more employable when you leave University.

You can monitor your employability skills and experience via Skills Log, a space to log your working, participation or volunteering

hours to build up a history of all your extra-curricular activities.

Food, Drink and Entertainment

Lincoln Students' Union runs your on-campus sports bar and pub, Tower Bar and The Swan, as well as Lincoln's unique on-the-water cocktail bar, The Barge. Watch sports, relax with a burger or celebrate across these three venues.

The Union also runs The Engine Shed, Lincoln's largest live music and entertainment venue. It hosts student club nights and has brought big artists right to the centre of campus. Previous examples include Jimmy Carr and the Kaiser Chiefs.

Make sure you look out for our International events where you can meet and celebrate with other students from around the world. We will also be running a series of trips, which are perfect for helping international students to discover the UK beyond Lincoln. Previous trips have included London, Liverpool, Hull and Blackpool.

Please note there may be a cost involved with participating in Students' Union-run activities and events.

English Language Support

The English Language Centre (ELC) provides a range of English language, academic and social support for international students at the University of Lincoln.



University of Lincoln English Language Centre (ELC)

The teaching, learning and assessment style in the UK may be very different to that of your own country. To help you understand the UK academic culture and ensure you have every opportunity to succeed in your studies, the ELC offers the following support:

- Pre-sessional English and Academic Study Skills (PEASS) programmes prior to entry onto degree courses at the university
- In-sessional support, including English for Academic Purposes (EAP) courses and workshops throughout the academic term.

- An Individual Learning Plan on completion of the Lincoln English Language Assessment
- Free courses and workshops for all University of Lincoln students whose first language is not English
- A free drop-in service for one-to-one English language support
- Coach trips to UK cities – please note that there is a charge to participate in coach trips, with tickets typically priced between £10 and £12.

Diagnostic English Language Assessment and Individual Learning Plan

Once you are enrolled on your degree course, we strongly encourage you to take the Lincoln English Language Assessment (LELA). The LELA is a short assessment, which will help to determine the in-sessional courses that may be the most helpful to you alongside your studies. After completing the LELA, you will receive an Individual Learning Plan containing details of additional courses that are available.

Pre-sessional English and Academic Study Skills Courses

If you need to improve your English language level, or would like to prepare for studying at a UK university before starting your degree, the ELC offers Pre-sessional English and Academic Study Skills (PEASS) courses for suitably qualified students. There is a charge for these programmes.

The 10-week and five-week PEASS programmes are designed to help students:

- meet the minimum language requirements for their academic course
- adapt to an unfamiliar academic culture in UK higher education
- use academic English effectively in speech and writing
- work independently during their studies.

In-sessional Programmes

Throughout your studies, you can access in-sessional support, which will provide you with opportunities to improve your writing, listening and speaking skills and make new friends with students from around the world. Support available includes:

Courses and Workshops

The English Language Centre runs a selection of free courses and workshops during term time. Examples include:

- Grammar for academic writing
- Literature review and methodology writing
- Culture and conversation
- Active listening
- Better pronunciation
- Seminar discussion skills
- Effective presentation skills
- Critical reading skills
- English for dissertation writing
- English for business.

Tuition Fees, Scholarships and Living Costs

Studying overseas is a great investment in your future, although before you begin it's important to think about how you will fund your studies.

Tuition Fees

As a student at the University of Lincoln, you will be required to pay tuition fees for each year of your course. Depending on the type of programme and study level, the cost of tuition can vary.

For the 2020/21 academic year, tuition fees for international students are as follows:

Undergraduate Courses
£14,100 – £15,900

Postgraduate Courses (Master's)
£14,600 – £16,000

Research Courses (e.g. PhD)
£14,100 – £16,100

MBA
£16,300.

Please note that tuition fees for students from the European Union differ from the above. The fees quoted are for one year of study. For continuing students fees are subject to an increase of two per cent each year and rounded to the nearest £100. How to Pay

Scholarships and Funding

Each year, the University of Lincoln awards a number of merit-based, subject-specific and country-focused scholarships and bursaries to students. Examples include the

Living Costs

In addition to tuition fees, it is important to consider the cost of living during your studies. This typically includes expenses such as accommodation, food, travel and social activities.

For students who require a visa to study in the UK, the UK Visas and Immigration Office will require you to demonstrate that you have access to at least £1,015 per month for your living costs. This amount will need to be verified when you apply for your visa. The cost of living as a student at the University of Lincoln can vary according to your lifestyle choices, so it is important to create a budget prior to your arrival. To help you plan your finances, the information below is an approximate guide to some living costs:

- In 2019/2020 accommodation options ranged from around £70 a week up to £300 a week.
- Student gym memberships at our Sports Centre were £18 a month in 2018/2019.
- Food typically costs £130 – £200 a month depending on tastes
- A mobile phone sim is around £15 per month. Free Wi-Fi is available on campus.

Applying to Lincoln

Prior to, and during, your application to the University of Lincoln, our International Team and overseas representatives are available to provide support and guidance in a range of areas.

Step-by-Step Guide to Applying

1. Choose Your Course

On our website, you can find detailed information about our full range of undergraduate, postgraduate and short courses: www.lincoln.ac.uk/studyatlincoln As well as visiting our course pages online, you may wish to speak to a University of Lincoln representative in your country; this can be a great way to find out more about your study options. 2. Check the Entry Requirements

After deciding which course you would like to apply to, it is important that you check the academic and English language entry requirements. Visit our country page to find out more: www.lincoln.ac.uk/yourcountry

3. Check for a Closing Date

Depending on the course you wish to apply to, there are different closing dates throughout the year,

which you will need to consider. For undergraduate courses, applications should reach UCAS between 1 September 2019 and 15 January 2020. Late applications will only be considered if suitable vacancies remain. Most postgraduate courses have no official closing date for applications, although as an international student you may need to factor in additional time for your visa application.

The majority of our postgraduate taught courses commence in September, although some courses also have intakes in January or February.

4. Are You Eligible for a Scholarship?

Each year, we award a number of scholarships to high-achieving students from around the world. If you are applying for a research programme, it is important that you draft a research proposal which outlines the topic or theme you intend to explore.

Applying for Your Visa

Unless you are a national of the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland, you will usually need to apply for a Tier 4 Student Visa before you travel to the UK. In most cases, your visa application will need to be made in your home country.

For students who require a Tier 4 Visa and are currently in the UK, it may be possible to apply without the need to travel home. If this is the case, the University of Lincoln's International Advice Team may be able to help you with your application.

Depending on whether you have an official financial sponsor and on the level, type or length of your course, it may be possible for your dependants to apply to stay in the UK with you during your studies.

Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies

As part of your visa application, UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) require you to be formally sponsored by a licensed UK higher education institution such as the University of Lincoln. Official sponsorship of your visa is known as a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS). Once you have met all of the conditions of your offer, accepted your unconditional offer and paid a £2,000 deposit, our International Admissions Team will issue you with a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) number. The CAS number will enable UKVI to access information about you in support of your Tier 4 Visa application.

Please note that you can only apply for a Tier 4 Student Visa if your course is full-time.

These programmes are specially designed to help you gain the academic, English language and learning skills you need to succeed, giving you the best possible start to your UK education.



A Supportive Learning Environment

International and EU students who do not meet the minimum undergraduate entry requirements may have the opportunity to study a preparation course at the University of Lincoln International Study Centre.

Students can apply for the International Foundation Year, a one-year course that aims to prepare you for the first year of your chosen degree. Students can choose from two subject routes:

- International Foundation Year in Business and Media
- International Foundation Year in Engineering and Computing

Students can also apply for the International Year One, an intensive, one-year course that is the equivalent of the first year of an undergraduate degree. Students can choose from four subject routes:

- International Year One in Business and Management
- International Year One in Computer Science
- International Year One in Engineering
- International Year One in Media Studies

Upon successful completion, students are able to progress to an undergraduate degree at the University of Lincoln.

International Foundation Year

Commencing in September or January, the International Foundation Year offers students the chance to specialise in business, media studies, engineering or computing. This programme is delivered over three terms.

For students who successfully complete the International Foundation Year and achieve the necessary grades, progression to year one of a relevant University of Lincoln degree is permitted.

International Year One

The International Year One is a specially designed pathway to the second year of an undergraduate degree at the University of Lincoln. International Year One students can choose from four routes: business and management, computer science, engineering and media studies. Depending on your chosen programme and English language level, you may start in September, October or January with your studies comprising of either three, three-and-a-half or four terms.

On successful completion of the programme and achievement of the required grades, students can progress to the second year of their chosen undergraduate degree at the University of Lincoln. Should students not reach the required grades for progression, it may be possible to progress to year one.

Entry Requirements

Age: 18 years of age or above

Academic: Completion of secondary school with good grades (plus one year of further study for three terms)

English Language:

Three terms: Academic IELTS for UKVI 5.0 (no minimum writing requirement)*

Three-and-a-half terms: Academic IELTS for UKVI 4.5 or equivalent (no minimum writing requirement)*

Four terms: Academic IELTS for UKVI 4.0 or equivalent.*

Studying in the UK is a great way to experience a different culture and perspective, and this can be further enhanced by a period of study in another country. A number of our degrees include the opportunity to complete a study period abroad. For example, undergraduate students on International Business Management, International Tourism Management or Events Management courses are able to spend around four months learning at an overseas university as part of our exchange programme.

Opportunities for study abroad are currently available in Mexico, China, India, Malaysia, USA, France, Spain, Germany, Switzerland, Malta, Sweden and Finland. Please note there may be additional tuition fees and students will also need to pay for all living expenses while abroad.

College of Science



Lincolnshire has a long association with industrial innovation and pioneering science, and those bonds are evident across the University of Lincoln's Brayford Pool Campus and the county around it.

The College of Science centres on the £28 million Isaac Newton Building, which is named after one of Lincolnshire's most famous sons, the great 17th century mathematician, physicist and astronomer. It was officially opened in October 2017 by the UK's most senior scientist, Professor Sir Mark Walport, and is now home to the scientists, engineers and mathematicians of the future.

Our Joseph Banks Laboratories are named after the 18th century explorer and botanist who advised King George III on Kew Gardens in London, and who was likely inspired by the Lincolnshire countryside surrounding his family's home. The laboratories contain the latest equipment for molecular and cell biology, microbiology, tissue biology, bioacoustics, DNA analysis, crystal engineering, molecular and nanomaterials syntheses, and 3D molecular and materials modelling.

Nearby Minster House has research facilities for animal cognition, behaviour and welfare research, while the Boole Technology Centre on the adjacent Science and Innovation Park is named after the mathematician, philosopher and logician who founded Boolean algebra and was born in Lincoln. George Boole's work is considered one of the founding pillars of the digital age.

A number of Schools across the College have developed strong links with industry and external partners, ensuring that our programmes are industry-relevant, enabling students to engage with employers in the competitive global jobs market. For example, partnerships with regional and national chemical science companies and organisations aim to ensure that our curriculum is current and relevant, while our status as Global Principal Partner with Siemens gives Lincoln graduates enhanced opportunities for placements and mentoring.

Our portfolio - both in academic courses and facilities - highlights the University of Lincoln's significant growth, support for industry, and commitment to the provision and advancement of key STEM subjects.



The College of Science also has impressive facilities dedicated to agri-food technology and the food industry. The Lincoln Institute for Agri-Food Technology (LIAT) is based at the 200-hectare Riseholme Campus just north of Lincoln, where researchers enjoy access to a working farm, woodlands, grasslands and watercourses. Our National Centre for Food Manufacturing (NCFM) in Holbeach, south Lincolnshire, is designed to help advance the careers of food industry employees.

A number of courses across the School are accredited by the Royal Society of Chemistry, which is the UK's leading professional body for chemical scientists.

Students can also learn from industry guest speakers, with previous speakers from companies such as AstraZeneca. This helps students focus on advancing the chemical sciences to tackle real-world problems.

Facilities

The School of Chemistry is based in the Joseph Banks Laboratories where students have access to high-specification instrumentation for spectroscopy, diffraction, imaging and separation science. There are also opportunities to develop expertise with nuclear magnetic resonance, mass spectrometry, chromatography, electron microscopy and X-ray diffraction.

Study will also take place in the purpose-built Janet Lane-Clayton Building, which offers specialist laboratories and teaching spaces. This building contains large chemistry teaching laboratories fitted with integrated fumehoods for advanced chemistry practicals and a dedicated analytical suite. A 'scene of crime' house used by students, and police professionals, is located at our Riseholme Campus for training in crime scene examination and management.

Placements

The School of Chemistry offers an innovative 'end-on' full-year placement programme for all students in the fourth year of the MChem programmes. This industrial placement is an optional module and students may be placed with one of the University of Lincoln's industry or overseas partners, or in one of the University's research groups. Placements are conducted alongside advanced academic study focusing on research frontiers in chemistry. Salaried placements are competitive and subject to visa restrictions.

Your Future

Our graduates have progressed to positions in multi-national companies such as GlaxoSmithKline and Nestle, as well as at government agencies in a variety of roles.

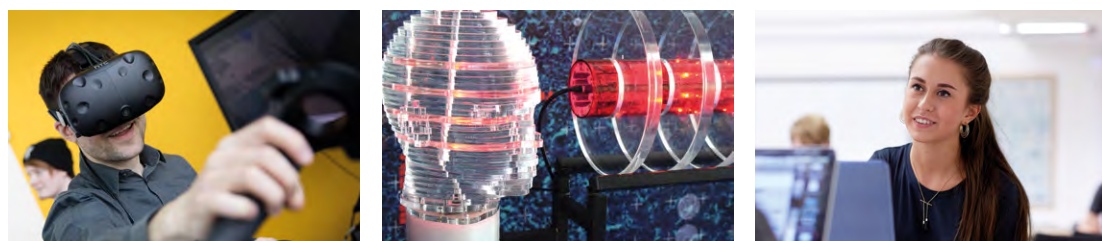

A number of courses across the School of Computer Science are accredited by the British Computer Society, which has members in 150 countries, and the Institution of Analysts and Programmers.

The School of Computer Science has research expertise in computing technologies and information systems. This includes specialisms in robotics and autonomous systems, computer vision and image engineering, games computing and playful technologies, human computer interactions, medical applications of technology, artificial intelligence, data science and machine learning.

Facilities and Equipment

The School of Computer Science is based in the £28 million Isaac Newton Building. Resources include laboratories that house technical and computing technologies including PCs, Macs, and Raspberry Pis to support teaching and our students' research activities. Students also benefit from software development environments such as Visual Studio, Unity, and the Unreal Engine, games design and development platforms, 3D modelling software, as well as virtual and augmented reality capable systems. The School also provides access to a wide variety of additional equipment including smartphones, robots, and sensors.

Expertise

Research is based on finding real-world solutions to advance society. Examples include the creation of robots to work in warehouses, museums, care homes and on farms. Collaborations also exist with other departments such as agri-robotics.

Careers and Your Future

Graduates from the School of Computer Science have secured roles at major companies and organisations such as GCHQ, IBM, Bloomberg, PwC, JP Morgan, and G4S. Games Computing graduates have gone on to work for industry giants such as Electronic Arts (EA Games), Criterion Games, Rockstar, and Team 17, while others have also found employment at companies such as Jagex, BAE Systems and in the financial sector.



Professor Nigel Allinson MBE, from Lincoln's School of Computer Science, is leading a pioneering research project to develop more effective radiotherapy treatment for thousands of cancer sufferers. The project, called OPTIma (Optimising Proton Therapy through Imaging), is funded by a £3.3 million grant from the UK's Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council. It is believed some of the more difficult tumours will become treatable and most patients will have better outcomes.

The University worked with Siemens and other employers to establish Lincoln's School of Engineering. This delivers benefits for students, including bursaries, internships and workplace experience opportunities. It is the first new engineering school to be established in the UK for decades and is collocated with Siemens Global Product Training Institute.

Accreditation and Cross-Discipline Skills

The University of Lincoln Mechanical Engineering courses are accredited by the Institution of Mechanical Engineers (IMechE). Strong links exist between our Mechanical and Electrical programmes, enabling our students to develop the cross-disciplinary focus necessary for the modern engineer, and an understanding of industry perspectives. Automation Engineering at Lincoln has been designed in collaboration with global industrial giants such as B&R Automation and Schneider Electric.

Past, Present and Future

Lincoln has a long and proud history of engineering. The city was the birthplace of the tank in 1915, and a memorial to the Lincoln engineers who invented it is located on the roundabout close to the University. It was also at the centre of the UK's fledgling aviation industry, and led the way in gas turbines.

Our purpose-built Engineering Hub is based in the University's £28 million Isaac Newton Building. It is a centre of technical innovation that houses industry-standard machinery, turbines, and extensive research/teaching facilities, including laser, anechoic, robotics, communications and electrical laboratories.

Your Career

Our courses aim to produce industry-ready graduates with product design and innovative sense who are highly skilled, creative engineers able to adapt to new challenges and deliver sustainable solutions. Previous graduates have gone on to work at Rolls-Royce, QinetiQ, JCB Power Systems, British Steel, and Jaguar Land Rover.



Intelligent software that can automatically detect system faults in industrial machines is being developed by School of Engineering researchers in a bid to assist current support engineers and plug an expanding skills gap in the engineering industry. The EVES (Evolutionary Virtual Expert System) project is being created by the University of Lincoln in partnership with Siemens Industrial Turbomachinery Ltd, thanks to a First Investigator Award of almost £100,000.

The geography degrees at Lincoln are accredited by the Royal Geographical Society and represent one of the most significant investments in UK university geography for a generation.

The School of Geography is also closely linked to the Lincoln Centre for Water and Planetary Health and the Rural Research Group.

Expertise and Specialisms

The foundational Head of School is Professor Mark Macklin whose expertise lies in river systems, global environmental change and in catchment hazard and pollution issues. Other specialisms across the School include forecasting and evaluating climate and weather-related risks, the vulnerability of coastal wetlands and applying the latest GIS and remote sensing data analysis techniques to global challenges, including rapid humanitarian responses to natural crises, the management of aquatic environments and the spread of diseases such as malaria.

Field Trips

Students may benefit from field trips to support the development of core skills in gathering, collating, and analysing data. Previous destinations have included Crete and the Lincolnshire Coast. These give students the chance to apply geographical knowledge in real-world settings.

Join In and Make a Difference

Students launched the Geographical Society in 2017 to offer additional extra-curricular activities, including subject-specific outings and social events. The University's Great Lives lecture series also has regular speakers of interest to geography students. One speaker in 2019 was author and explorer Jason Lewis, who became the first person to circumnavigate the Earth without using motors or sails. Student projects have access to data from the School's Davis Vantage Pro 2 automatic weather station (AWS) on the roof of the Isaac Newton Building.

Your Future

Geography can provide a broad range of career opportunities, including roles in the geographical information system industry, social and environmental consultancy, and land-use planning and policy.



Professor Mark Macklin from the University of Lincoln was awarded the 2018 Royal Geographical Society (with IBG) Murchison Award for his pioneering research into the study of the form and function of rivers and the interaction between rivers and the landscape around them – so called 'fluvial geomorphology' and its applications. Professor Macklin is the founding Head of the School of Geography and also oversees the Lincoln Centre for Water and Planetary Health.

More than 90 per cent of research in the School was rated as ‘world leading’ or ‘internationally excellent’ in REF2014. A focus on practical teaching is at the heart of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

Our courses cover the subject areas of animal behaviour and welfare, biochemistry, biology, biomedical science, ecology and conservation, microbial technology and zoology.

Facilities

Undergraduate and postgraduate students use facilities in accordance with the type and level of their course. However, as a whole, specialist equipment and facilities include a cell culture suite, analytical chemistry instrumentation, protein purification equipment, and advanced microscopy facilities. These include a scanning electron microscope, atomic force spectroscopy, confocal equipment, and molecular biology facilities.

There are also aquatic and reptile facilities, an insectary, an animal behaviour clinic and a bioacoustics laboratory. Specialist analytical equipment also includes haematology and clinical chemistry analysers, tissue processing equipment, and microtomes and microscopes similar to those used in clinical practice.

Field Trips

Students have previously enjoyed self-funded optional field trips to the Cloud Forest in Ecuador, and the Mankwe Wildlife Reserve in South Africa. Other trips have been to Peniche in Portugal, and Kevo in Finland and all are designed to promote skills in wildlife identification, field techniques and data collection. Residential field trips and day trips in the UK are also a feature of many courses, previous examples have included farms, animal rescue centres and zoos as well as Kew Gardens and the Millennium Seed Bank.

Your Future

Our graduates have also gone on to work in both practical and research roles that involve the management, welfare, training, and conservation of companion, farm, and wild animals.

Sir Isaac Newton is said to have pondered the nature of gravity after witnessing an apple fall from a tree in his Lincolnshire garden, and a graft of that tree is currently being matured here at the University of Lincoln.

That means studying here could be the ideal way to grow your own love for Mathematics and Physics, with many of our courses accredited by the Institute of Mathematics and its Applications or the Institute of Physics.

History and Collaboration

The Lincoln School of Mathematics and Physics opened its doors in September 2014. Staff conduct cutting-edge research in fundamental and applied mathematics and physics, ranging from pure mathematics to applied nano-science at the interface between biology, chemistry, physics and mathematics.

The School collaborates with research institutions in Germany, Japan, Norway, the Netherlands, Singapore, Spain and the USA.

Facilities

The School of Mathematics and Physics is based in one of the University's latest additions: the Isaac Newton Building. This £28 million facility promotes education and research collaboration with the School of Engineering and the School of Computer Science.

It is home to one of the University's industry partners, Siemens. Physics students have access to equipment for advanced materials characterisation techniques, such as electron microscopy and X-ray diffractometry, in the Joseph Banks Laboratories. Students can also access workshops and computer laboratories.

Events and Community

Mathematics and Physics students have access to events specific to their areas of study, or as social outings with fellow students. Previous examples have included a Maths Awards Day at the Petwood Hotel in Woodhall Spa, and lectures from scientists, explorers and engineers as well as leading voices in mathematics, physics and astronomy such as Professor Julia M Yeomans FRS.



An astrophysicist at the University of Lincoln, Dr Phil Sutton, has calculated that moons orbiting planets outside our solar system could offer another clue about extra-terrestrial life. Some planets, especially large gas giants, may harbour moons which contain liquid water. Dr Sutton's research looked at the possibility of moons orbiting the exoplanet J1407b, analysing whether they may have caused gaps in the planet's ring system. His work attracted worldwide attention when it was published in 2019.

Our MPharm degree course is accredited by the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC), which is the regulator for pharmacy in Great Britain. The GPhC sets the standards for the education of pharmacists.

Our graduates can progress to their pre-registration training, after which they can register as a pharmacist if they meet all of the stipulated professional criteria set by the GPhC. Our students came top in the national selection process for pre-registration placements in a 2019 NHS national recruitment report.

Facilities

Students are predominantly based in the University's Joseph Banks Laboratories, which offer specialist clinical and teaching spaces, including consultation rooms, a medicines information suite, a clinical skills suite, and well-equipped research laboratories. Our Science and Innovation Park, which is home to the Joseph Banks Laboratories, was developed with leading regional pharmaceutical company the Lincolnshire Co-op, and is a regional hub for science industry innovation and development.

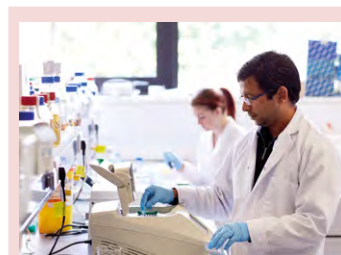
Careers and Research

The School has developed extensive links with hospital and community pharmacy and with the pharmaceutical industry in the region and on a national and international level.

An annual careers fair allows students the opportunity to speak face to face with industry delegates from major companies. Previous examples include the UK's National Health Service (NHS), Boots, and the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

Our research covers pre-clinical aspects of the drug discovery and development pipeline from the identification of novel drug targets, the design of new and improved drugs and antibiotics, to the development of improved methods of delivery.

Pharmacists are to be found within the pharmaceutical industry and regulatory bodies, undertaking a variety of roles such as research and development, or regulatory and drug safety roles.



Scientists from the University of Lincoln are at the forefront of international efforts to develop new drug treatments for the global fight against antibiotic-resistant bacteria, often called 'superbugs'. Dr Ishwar Singh, from Lincoln's School of Pharmacy, and his colleagues have made vital advances towards developing a newly discovered antibiotic substance called teixobactin into a viable drug treatment. The team has successfully produced a synthesised version.

The University of Lincoln is ranked in the top 200 in the world for Agriculture and Forestry in the QS World University Rankings 2019. Agriculture research was also ranked among the best in the UK in REF 2014.

The Lincoln Institute for Agri-food Technology (LIAT) aims to support and enhance productivity, efficiency and sustainability in food and farming through research, education and technology.

Accredited and Led by Experts

Our courses include the innovative MSc in Agri-food Technology, which is accredited by the Institute of Food Science and Technology. IFST is the UK's leading professional body for food science and technology. This programme is led by Dr Ramana Sundara, who worked for Nestlé for 20 years in Switzerland and England, before helping to establish the course in line with industry practices. Lincolnshire is considered the agricultural heartland of the UK. The county has an international reputation for food, fish and farming, with one of the largest concentrations of food manufacturing, research, storage and distribution in Europe. Research partners have included Moy Park, Marks and Spencer, and Tesco.

Placements and Field Trips

MSc Agri-food Technology students have the option to gain work experience in British industry for up to six months, if they choose the Professional Practice pathway. Students source their own placements, but guidance can be provided. A work placement can be a great way to put theory into practice, alongside adding valuable experience to your CV.

Across the Institute, students may have the opportunity to take part in field trips. As an example, students visited the world's first underground farm, which is based in Clapham, London. This was to learn about farming techniques linked to industrial digitalisation. Students observed hydroponic systems and LED technology being used to grow micro-herbs. Students also visited a Fresh Produce Consortium careers event in London.



The UK's first global centre of excellence in agrirobotics research is being created at the University of Lincoln thanks to a £6.4 million government grant. Universities and Science Minister Chris Skidmore said: "Pushing the boundaries of knowledge and conquering new innovations are what our universities are known for the world over. This programme, led by the University of Lincoln, will give the UK another world first in Lincoln's centre for research into farming robotics."

The College of Arts offers undergraduate and postgraduate courses in architecture, design, English, journalism, film, media, history, heritage, as well as fine and performing arts. Graduates have gone on to establish new businesses, develop new products, and become influential contributors to the creative industries in the UK and internationally.

Industry links and real-world engagement are at the heart of many of our courses. Many offer opportunities for work placements and field trips to put theory into practice, boosting your CV to make you stand out to an employer.

Students may benefit from readings and masterclasses by guest speakers from the creative industries. In the past guest speakers have included the Poet Laureate Dame Carol Ann Duffy, Dame Penelope Lively and author Chris Packham.

The Lincoln Performing Arts Centre (LPAC) on campus is a hub of creative performance where students can learn and rehearse in the Centre's 450-seat theatre, three large studio spaces, and a workshop for building sets and props. As well as student performances, the LPAC hosts a programme of comedy, dance, drama, and music throughout the year. Previous examples have included Shakespeare and Sherlock Holmes plays.

The Engine Shed venue, also on campus, hosts a wide variety of live entertainment while our own Indie-Lincs international film festival champions low and micro budget films, and their filmmakers.

Students can access the Media Archive for Central England, which is located on campus and is a public archive dedicated to researching and preserving collections of film and moving image materials.

There is also Project Space Plus, which is the University's open space for exhibition, creative inquiry, experimentation, and contemporary thinking.



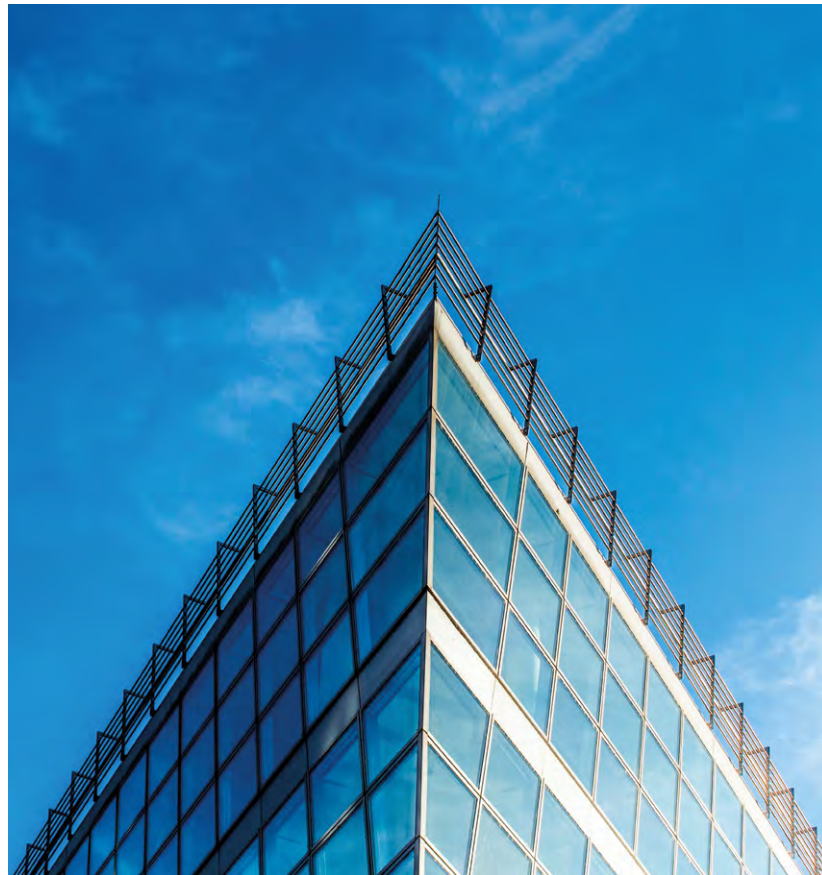

The School is home to undergraduate and postgraduate degree programmes in architecture, architectural technology, construction science and management, and international practice, with course content informed by current trends and innovative developments in architectural practice and the construction sector.

Accreditation and Industry-Informed

BArch (Hons) Architecture is validated by the Royal Institute of British Architects and prescribed by the Architects Registration Board as providing exemption from Part 1 examinations, which are required to register as an architect in the UK. It is also accredited by the Lembaga Arkitek Malaysia (the Board of Architects Malaysia).

The BSc (Hons) Construction Science and Management programme has been designed to meet the requirements of accreditation by the Chartered Institute of Building (CIOB).

The BSc (Hons) Architectural Science and Technology degree is designed to meet the requirements of accreditation by the Chartered Institute of Architectural Technologists (CIAT). The curriculum is designed to develop specific technical skills that are underpinned by a knowledge of construction science, building technology, digital engineering and architectural design.

The School is supported by a Professional Advisory Board (PAB) which is made up of experienced practitioners in the architectural and built environment professions. PAB provides high-level advice and counsel to the School.

Facilities and Equipment

Students have access to environmental science and land-surveying equipment, modern computer suites with advanced computer hardware and software, including CAD and Building Information Modelling (BIM), bespoke studios, information technology suites, and workshops that are equipped with a range of specialist resources, including rapid prototyping, 3D printing, and laser-cutting equipment.



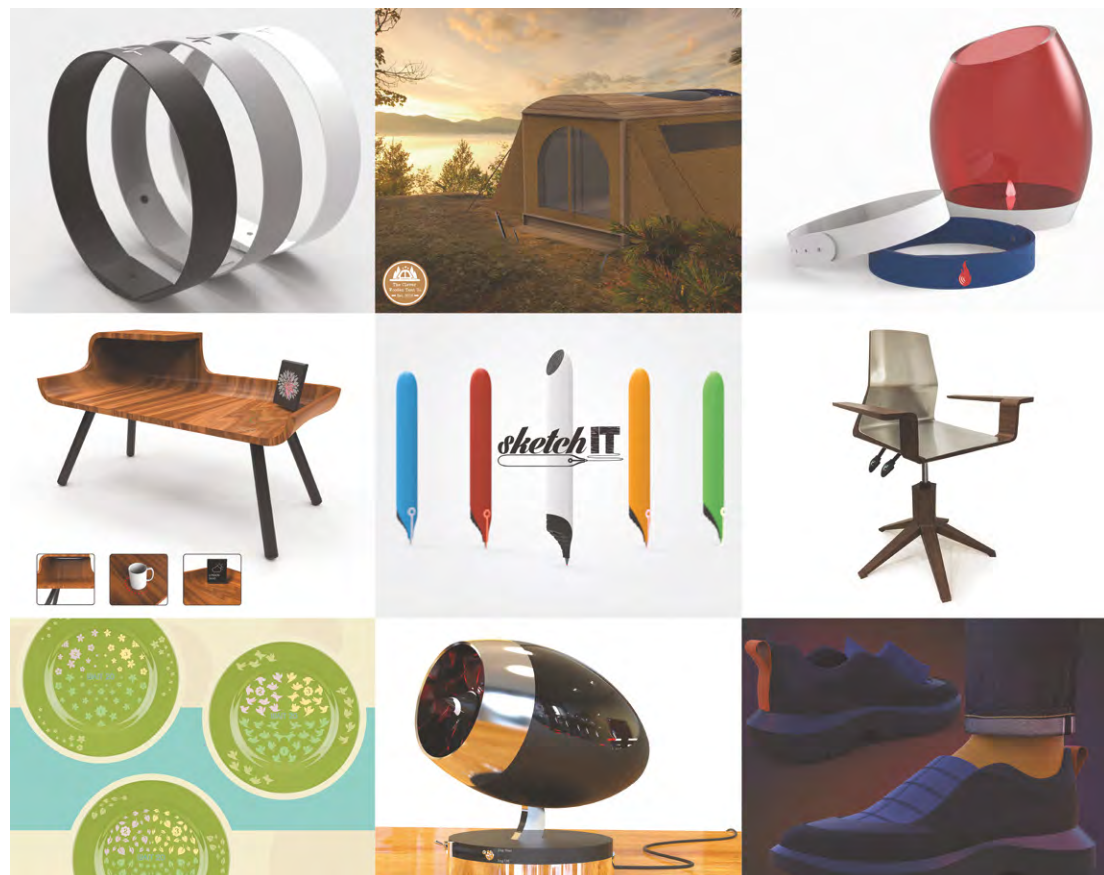

Facilities to Create

Students have regular access to workshops, labs, studios and industry standard equipment, as well as highly knowledgeable technicians.

Facilities include fashion workshops for a mixture of fabric sewing and pattern-cutting processes; Apple Mac computer suites; a MakerLab for working with ceramics, glass and precious metals; machinery and hand tools for the cutting, shaping and general fabrication of woods and metals; photography studios; and printmaking studios.

Taught by Experts

Courses are often run by academics with real-world experience. For example, academics on the MA Interior Architecture and Design course have experience in retail, heritage, transportation, residential, and adaptive reuse such as the British Airways Compass Centre at Heathrow. The staff also participate in professional organisations on local and international levels such as Interior Educators and GloW-DESIGN (Globally We Design).

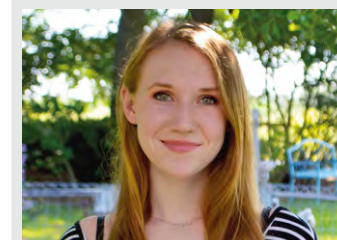
Research That Makes a Difference

Journalism

The School has relationships with mainstream broadcasters including the BBC and ITV, and regional newspapers. The University's campus-based media, offering more opportunities for student journalism, include community radio station Siren FM, the student station Brayford Radio, the School's web TV news service LSJ News and the Journalism students' own newspaper, The Linc. A number of our courses are accredited by the Broadcast Journalism Training Council, National Council for the Training of Journalists, and Professional Publishers Association. MA International Journalism is underpinned by the Thomson Reuters Foundation.

Gain Real Experience

Staff have industry experience, including at the BBC and ITV. New Media Lincs is a creative business based within the School which offers opportunities for students to undertake paid work experience alongside their studies, developing their CVs, showreels, portfolios and contacts in preparation for a career in industry.

The School also hosts the Indie-Lincs 'boutique' international film festival that champions low and micro budget films, and their filmmakers. Students have previously played an active part in the festival.

Settle In and Make a Difference

An International Buddy Scheme aims to help students quickly adjust to life at the University of Lincoln. Courses place an emphasis on practical production informed by theory. Collaborative projects, work experience and commissions for external businesses and organisations are on offer to all our students. Partners have included the NHS, Interflora, Lincolnshire Co-operative Society, Siemens, and Visit Lincolnshire.

Facilities

As well as being home to performing arts students, the centre hosts comedy, dance, drama and music performances from national touring companies and artists such as the Vienna Festival Ballet.

Fine art and fashion students benefit from specialist facilities. There are numerous opportunities to showcase your work, including the School's highly regarded end-of-year degree shows.

Opportunities for Development

Technical theatre and stage management students train in a public-facing professional venue while drama and theatre students can develop excellent practice alongside their research with a number of performance opportunities, including the Edinburgh Festival.

Dance students can work with professional choreographers and tour as part of the Lincoln Dance Collective while music students may present their work professionally. Previous examples have included working alongside innovative composers and musicians. The fine art programme enables students to work in a number of environments, including opportunities for civic engagement by supporting and working alongside community users, such as Addaction and HM Prison Service.

All students have the opportunity to audition for, and be part of, the the School's Lincoln Company. There are a number of roles including performing, producing, directing and marketing.

Learn from Experts

A range of artists and professionals are invited to deliver lectures and tutorials. Recent speakers include Assemble (Turner Prize winners, 2015), Ming Wong, Mark Titchner, Cath Keay, and Jordan Baseman.

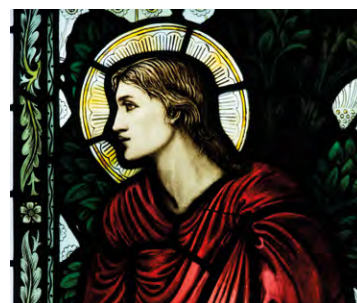

With its magnificent cathedral dating back over 900 years, a medieval castle, and an original 1215 Magna Carta, Lincoln is a fantastic city to study the past and to appreciate its impact on the present.

The School offers subjects across history, conservation, art history, classical studies, philosophy and American studies. All students are actively encouraged to attend, and participate in, research seminars. Previous examples include Cultures of Curating, and Travel in the 19th Century.

Steeped in 2000 Years of History

Known in Roman times as Lindum Colonia, the city has a wealth of ancient history and heritage both above and below ground. Traffic still travels through its third-century gate, the Newport Arch, and the University itself sits by the Brayford Pool, a Roman inland port connected to the River Trent by a Roman canal.

Making an Impact

The expertise of our Conservation of Cultural Heritage consultants located within the School has helped to inform the restoration of the Midland Grand Hotel (now known as the St Pancras Renaissance Hotel), HMS Victory, and Southwell Minster. When opportunities arise, students may apply to work on live projects, gaining professional experience. Previous projects have involved English Heritage, the National Trust, and the Historic Royal Palaces.

Past and Present

The city of Lincoln's archaeological museum, The Collection, houses artefacts from the county's fascinating history dating back to the Stone Age. On campus, the Media Archive for Central England (MACE) houses more than 2,000 films and moving images to offer an insight into 20th Century life in Britain.

Expand Your Horizons

Undergraduate students may choose to study abroad at one of our partner universities in Europe or North America, or to take on a work placement, internship or volunteer position, subject to visa restrictions. The School welcomes exchange students from Canada, the USA, the Czech Republic, Germany and the Netherlands. Optional self-funded international study visits have been to places including Berlin, Athens, Amsterdam and Florence.

The College of Social Science offers undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in subjects including sport and exercise science, law, education, health and social care, psychology, and social and political sciences.

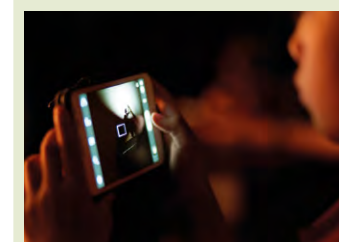
Students within the College have access to a range of inspirational learning spaces, including the £19 million Sarah Swift Building, which was named after the Lincolnshire-born founder of the Royal College of Nursing. It features clinical suites and specialist laboratories for health and social care and psychology students.

The Human Performance Centre, which is part of the School of Sport and Exercise Science, works with elite athletes using technologies such as motion capture and physiological testing to help athletes maximise their performance. The specialist laboratories undertake physiological and biomechanical assessment and are equipped for both teaching, research, and also outside consultancy.

Lincoln Law School also features a Moot Court located in the refurbished Bridge House where students can utilise the mock-court environment as part of their studies and assessments. With a judges' bench, witness stand, clerks' desk, as well as prosecution and defence solicitors' benches the Moot Court allows students to explore the key principles of modern legal practice in a variety of courtroom roles. Research within the College of Social Science is diverse. Students can benefit from the research expertise of academics and may have the opportunity to engage with major research projects.

For example, psychology students can participate in initiatives such as 'Summer Scientist'. The event involves the participation of children between the ages of three and 10 in a series of activities which explore different aspects of cognitive development.

Research in the College of Social Science has the ability to change our understanding of individuals' relationships with society. For example, the Community and Health Research Unit focuses on primary care, pre-hospital care, and older people and well-being. Its work continues to have important influence on service users, clinical and operational practice, and policy in the UK and internationally.



Pre-teens who use a mobile phone or watch TV in the dark an hour before bed are at risk of not getting enough sleep compared to those who use these devices in a lit room or do not use them at all before bedtime, according to research involving the University of Lincoln. Lead author Dr Michael Mireku, a researcher from the School of Psychology, said: "Our findings are significant not only for parents but for teachers, health professionals and adolescents themselves."

The School of Education is home to a diverse community of students and researchers from a wide range of countries such as China, Saudi Arabia, Ireland, Malta, and Algeria.

The School of Education offers a range of courses exploring the four pillars of education: philosophy, history, psychology and sociology.

Undergraduate

The BA (Hons) Education aims to provide insight into how children and young people learn and the ways in which this is shaped and delivered. The programme considers the different ways in which education is implemented and understood throughout the UK and globally. Students are encouraged to undertake small-scale research projects in an area of education, such as learning or teaching approaches, comparisons of global education systems, studies of curricula, or special educational needs.

The BSc (Hons) Education and Psychology programme aims to help students develop a greater understanding about how psychological processes underpin the learning experience. The course combines elements of the BA (Hons) Education programme with key modules from BSc (Hons) Psychology.

Postgraduate

The MA Education typically allows students to choose two optional modules according to career intentions and interests, with specialisations in Leadership and Management, Social Justice, Language, and SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disability). The teaching team encourages applications from a diverse range of backgrounds, enabling career change or progression. The course seeks to capitalise on an interest in education from those already inside the sector, or those looking to enter it in a variety of roles.

The PhD (Professional) Education is a doctoral research programme of equivalent standing to the traditional Doctor of Philosophy. Our MPhil/PhD is a research qualification aimed at those who are, or aspire to be, senior academic or administrative leaders of primary, secondary or tertiary educational institutions, or university lecturers or researchers. Students can also attend dedicated Study Schools.

The School of Health and Social Care undertakes practice-relevant research with health, social work, and social care providers and with policy makers to make an impact to try and change society for the better.

Teaching teams are made up of experienced academics, with extensive health, social work and social care professional experiences.

Real-life Skills

The BSc (Hons) Health and Social Care course reflects a change in international direction towards the community, and supporting people in their own homes and within their families. As part of the programme, students are offered access to additional training, such as First Aid, Mental Health First Aid and the ASSIST (Suicide Intervention) Training.

The BA (Hons) Applied Social Science brings together experience and expertise from across the College of Social Science. Students are encouraged to take part in work experience opportunities during their studies, for example volunteering in community groups.

The MPhil/PhD Health and Social Care is a research degree, informed by long-standing partnerships with professionals, research organisations, the social work sector, the National Health Service and through research projects within the School's research centre and research groups.

Gain Experience

The Erasmus Mundus MA Advanced Development in Social Work (ADVANCES) is explicitly targeted at qualified, experienced social workers from around the world who wish to upgrade their practice skills, especially with a transnational focus.

Participants will study in five leading universities across Europe: the University of Lincoln, Aalborg University (Denmark), Technical University of Lisbon (Portugal), University of Paris Ouest Nanterre La Defense (France), Warsaw University (Poland).

Examples of extra-curricular activities include Law Clinic, Street Law, Mooting, Masterclasses, and Mentoring. We also regularly invite guest speakers to the Law School to keep our students informed about current issues, and to provide networking opportunities.

Mentoring

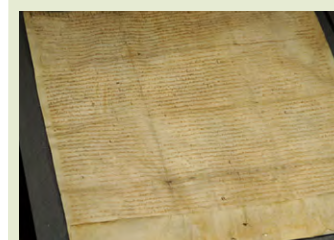
At Lincoln Law School we recognise the importance of students enhancing their employability during their time with us.

We offer a professional mentoring scheme, which is aimed at creating a supportive relationship between individuals working within the legal profession and Law School students. Students will have the opportunity to apply to take part in the scheme, which will give them the chance to gain insight, knowledge, and experience to help them make a successful transition from university to their chosen career.

Study Abroad

Lincoln Law School is an internationally inclusive community of students and staff. Each year we welcome students from across the world, including Europe, Africa, the Middle East and North America.

We have developed expertise in international law, and are increasingly involved in research and teaching collaborations with international institutions. As part of this community, new students have the opportunity to study abroad for one year at one of our partner universities. This increases an undergraduate degree programme to four years.

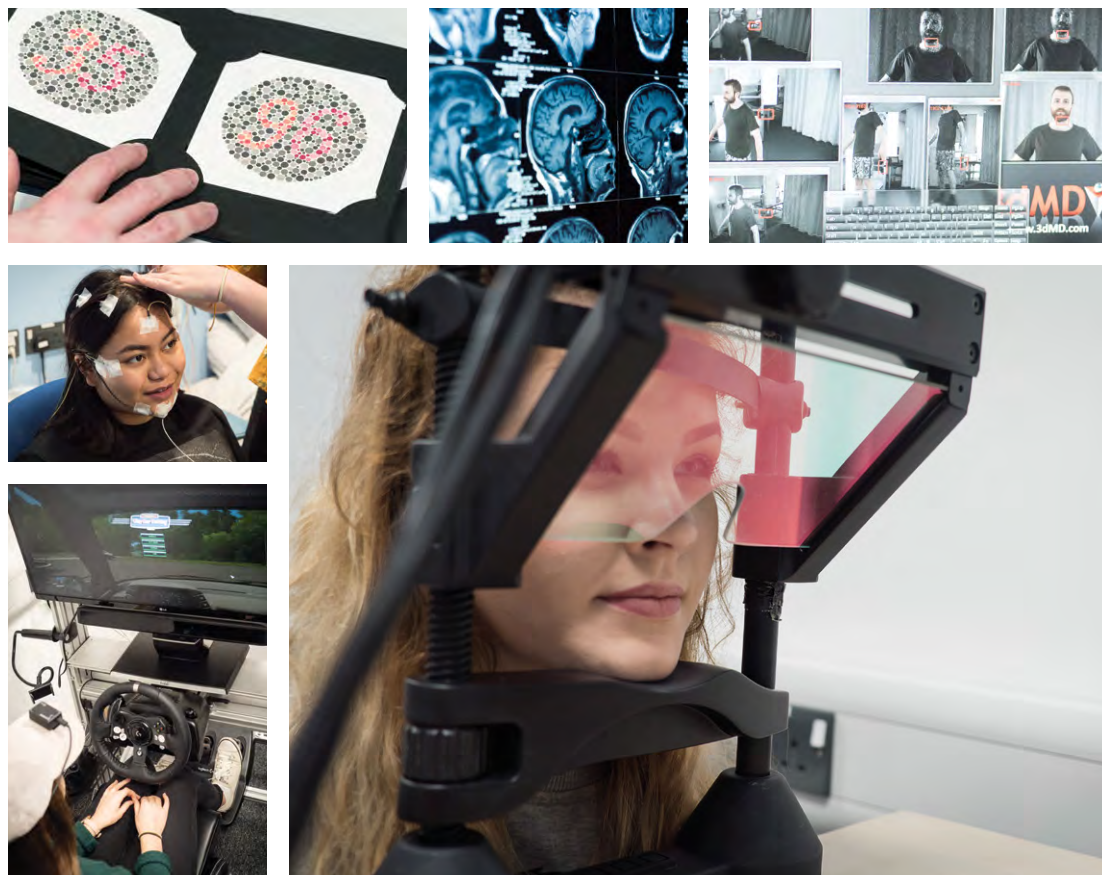


The city of Lincoln is home to one of only four surviving originals of the 1215 Magna Carta and is unique in also holding one of only two originals of the related 1217 Charter of the Forest. Magna Carta is recognised as the foundation of constitutional democracy in England and the source of many of the civil liberties enjoyed in free countries today, from trial by jury to fair taxation. It is on display at Lincoln Castle, which dates back to 1068.

Our accredited undergraduate courses and enticing postgraduate portfolio are hosted in excellent purpose built facilities designed to help you progress to the career you want.

Members of the School of Psychology are also very active in showcasing our research at various different public science festivals and one-off science events, including at the Natural History Museum in London.

Facilities

The University has invested £19 million in the Sarah Swift Building, a dedicated facility for the Schools of Health and Social Care and Psychology.

Specialist psychology research facilities include laboratories dedicated to studying sleep, EEG, psychophysiology and body scanning, and the Lincoln Infant and Child Development Laboratory – which is a specialist area for the study of child development.

The psychology labs in the Sarah Swift Building are used for research projects in areas such as forensic psychology, perception and cognition, development and social behaviour, and autism.

Global Opportunities

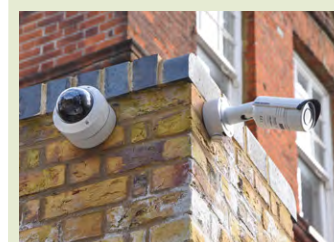
The School of Psychology offers several opportunities for cross cultural study experiences. Students can choose to study one year abroad or sign up for a short study trip abroad during their second or third year. If selected, additional costs may be involved.

Accreditation

Undergraduate psychology courses at the University of Lincoln are accredited by the British Psychological Society (BPS) as conferring eligibility for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership, which is the first step towards becoming a chartered psychologist in the UK.

Community Engagement

Students are encouraged to participate in original research projects alongside academic staff, with the opportunity to publish and present findings. For example, ‘Summer Scientist’ is an initiative that involves the participation of children in a series of games for research studies.



Dr Kay Ritchie from the University of Lincoln's School of Psychology appeared on BBC's Crimewatch Roadshow to discuss her work on improving CCTV images using face averages. Dr Ritchie led a study with psychologists from the UK and Australia to create a series of pictures using a 'face averaging' technique. This digitally combines multiple images into a single enhanced image, removing variants such as head angles or lighting so that only features which indicate the identity of the person remain.

The School of Social and Political Sciences encourages the development of globally aware graduates. A range of guest speakers and self-funded international field trips also aim to enhance student employability.

The School offers undergraduate programmes in criminology, international relations, politics, social policy and sociology, alongside postgraduate courses across the topics of gender studies, politics, international relations and criminology.

Real Experiences in the Centres of Power

Self-funded field trips seek to put students at the heart of diplomacy. Students have previously received briefings at national embassies and international organisations, such as the United Nations, NATO, EU headquarters, UNHCR, and the International Criminal Court. Participating students frequently cite the overseas study visit as a highlight of their university experience.

Use Your Own Voice

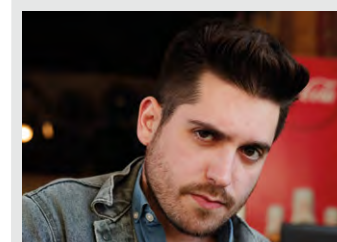
Examples of the innovative curriculum are the Model United Nations module, where students develop negotiating skills and practise diplomacy in a simulation of the UN General Assembly, and in the Parliamentary Studies module. This runs in cooperation with the Houses of Parliament. The module was awarded to Lincoln in a competitive process and is offered at just 20 universities.

Learn from Guest Speakers

Guest lectures from politicians, civil servants, and those working in the third sector also enable students to engage beyond academia. The School is proud of its alumni and hosts an annual alumni evening at which current students hear from and meet former students, including serving Members of Parliament, members of the Armed Forces and alumni working for national and international charities and the Police and Probation Services.

Research

Academic staff are research active across a range of areas including: parliament and policy, crime and security, social justice and equality, gender and sexuality, and comparative and international politics.



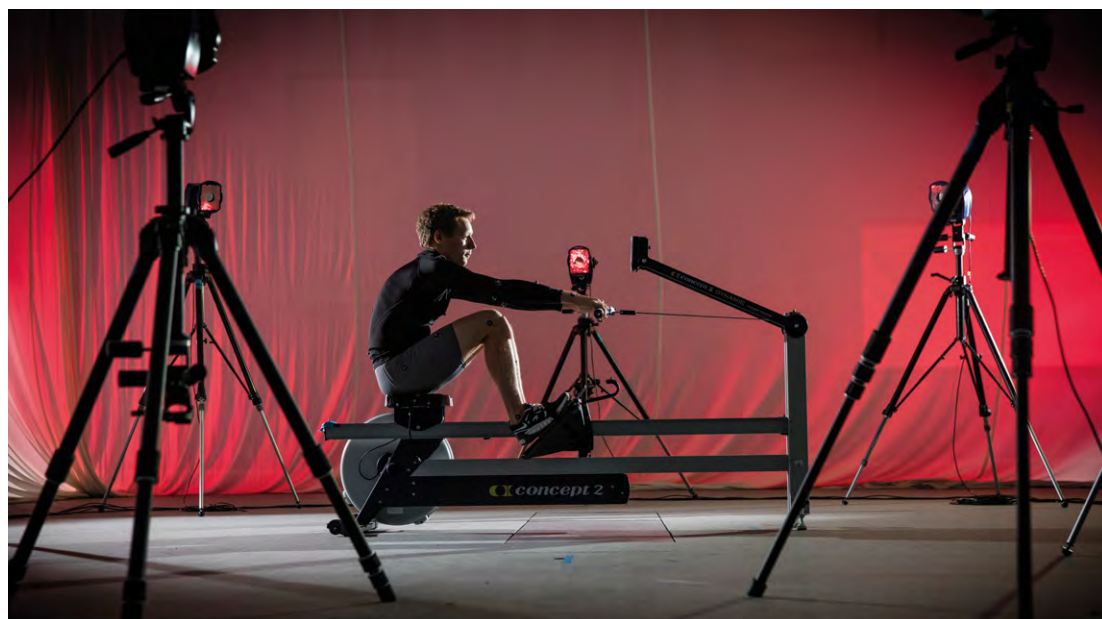

A number of professional qualifications are integrated into several courses at no extra cost. These include Gym Instruction, Personal Training, and Exercise Referral. British Orienteering, British Canoeing, and Active Lincolnshire have close links with the School.

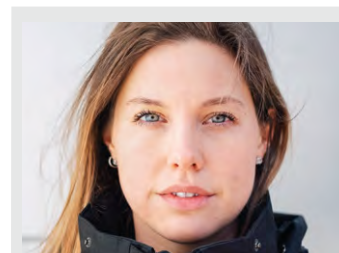
Research

The Health Advancement Research Team has conducted a variety of research and evaluation projects on behalf of organisations on subjects including obesity, ageing, exercise referral and children's physical activity. The School has worked with organisations including Active Lincolnshire, and Public Health Lincolnshire.

Facilities

Students have access to specialist equipment in the University's Human Performance Centre which contains a fully equipped strength and conditioning training facility, specialised laboratories, and an 'endless pool'. These facilities provide students with an opportunity to engage in applied work, and increase their practical experience. High profile sports organisations have used the facilities, including British Canoeing and British Ice Skating.

The University's on-campus Sports Centre also provides facilities including five-a-side football pitches, squash courts, basketball courts, hockey pitches, trampolines, and a well-equipped gym.
