LEARNING AT BIRMINGHAM

Whatever subject you choose to study, university needs to prepare you for the rest of your life. Study at Birmingham is designed to be different from anything you have experienced before and you should expect to be challenged and inspired.



At Birmingham, there are great relationships between academics and students. Students are valued as individuals, and the academics are so approachable and keen to help their students to succeed. Biomedical Science has around 20 contact hours a week in the first and second years, and in the third year, this was reduced to around 13, depending on what modules you pick. TEACHING AND LEARNING

Your Teaching and Learning Building is designed to foster collaboration and communication, with social study spaces, individual study areas, seminar rooms and lecture theatres.

We continually adapt our teaching to suit the needs of our students, and during the Covid-19 pandemic, our academics moved quickly to innovate and transform our degree programmes to online and blended provision.

Examples include:

- Law students continuing pro bono activities in a new online format, as well as completing virtual placements
- Using interactive technologies in our science laboratories with teams of students split between lab-based and home-based – one acting as the ‘hands’ and the other completing calculations at home, with multi-camera video calls between the two to discuss the experiment
- Music students carrying out video assessments for performance recitals
- Delivering translation and interpretation sessions online using specialist software for Modern Languages students

The sheer variety of topics and modules I've been able to study has been the best thing about studying at Birmingham so far. I've studied topics as diverse as post-war French theatre to German politics and medieval literature; I've loved all of my optional modules and they've all offered a new perspective on the cultures where my target languages are spoken.

Birmingham's campus also offers no end of diverse study spaces, so there's always somewhere to go on campus depending on what I need to do. The library has fantastic facilities and access to thousands of e-books. There are also new facilities being built every year!

My tutors have also been fantastic, and really easy to talk to with a deep understanding of their chosen fields. Our language tutors all have years of experience and one of them was so helpful to me in my Research Project last year in Medieval German Literature, which isn't always the most accessible topic. He helped me prepare with lists of suggested topics and books suitable for beginners and would make sure I'd understood the learning from that week. His sense of humour also made the process much more entertaining.

The support doesn't end when you've finished your studies, either, as our services are available even after you graduate.

I have used a lot of services offered by Careers Network, such as careers fairs and webinars about using LinkedIn or writing a CV. In my first year, I applied for a work experience bursary and was lucky enough to receive £800, enabling me to take part in voluntary work experience in Fiji. Not only did the money enable me to have the most amazing time of my life, but the process of interviews and applying will be a great experience for when I come to apply for graduate jobs.

The teamwork and presenting skills involved in pitching our enterprise idea made it all feel like an intense episode of *The Apprentice*!

I have had a lot of involvement with Careers Network over my time at Birmingham. I attended careers fairs and speaker-led careers talks such as the 'Insight into...' series which was useful for exploring typical public sector roles like human resources and marketing. Careers Network has also helped me to write a CV and cover letter as well



as preparing for interviews. I was offered work experience with a planning consultancy during the networking section of a careers talk about jobs in human geography and planning. Careers Network also provided me with a work experience bursary, which covered the transport and accommodation costs for the duration of my work experience and made it all possible!

I'm hoping to complete the Personal Skills Award (PSA) this year. It has accredited the wide range of activities that I already do so I can present formally to an employer. The employability skills workshops and free online courses have really helped me to think about how I can articulate these skills to an employer.

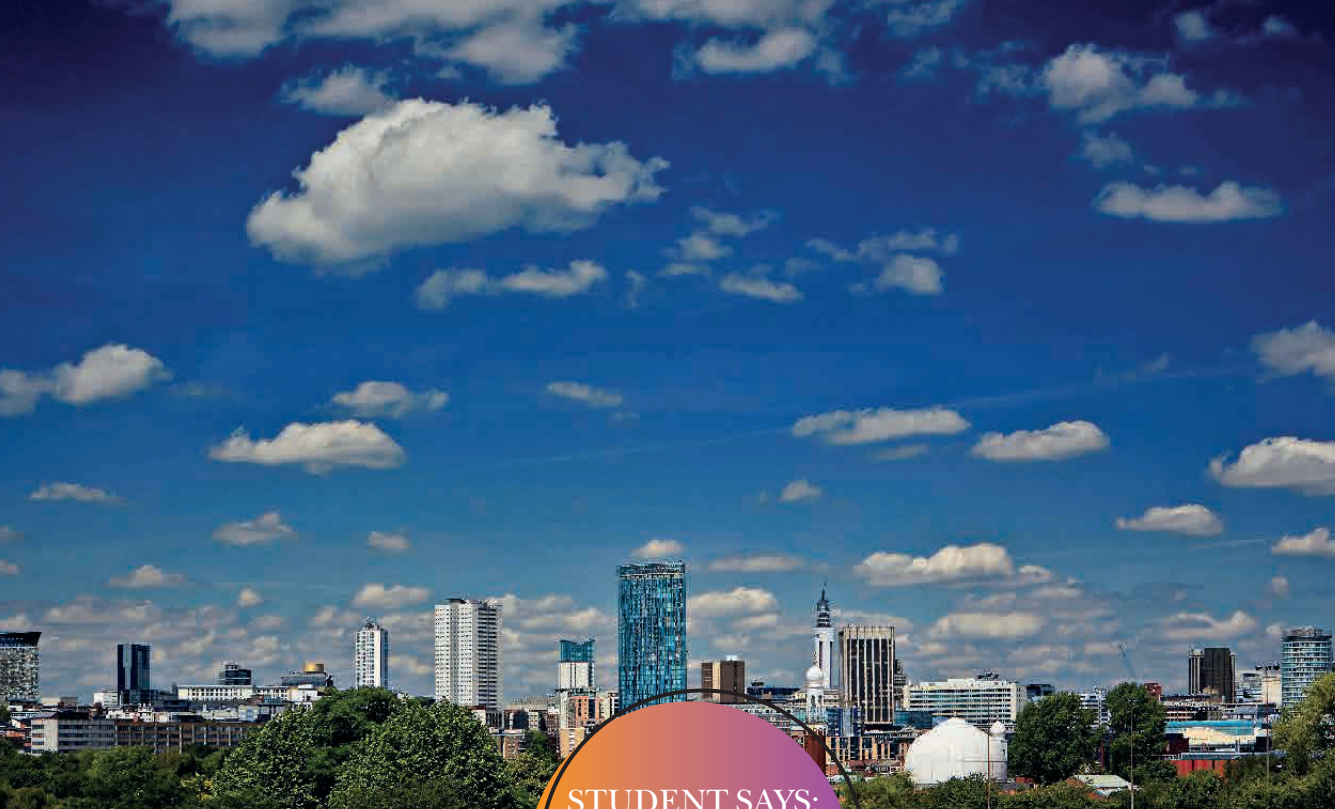



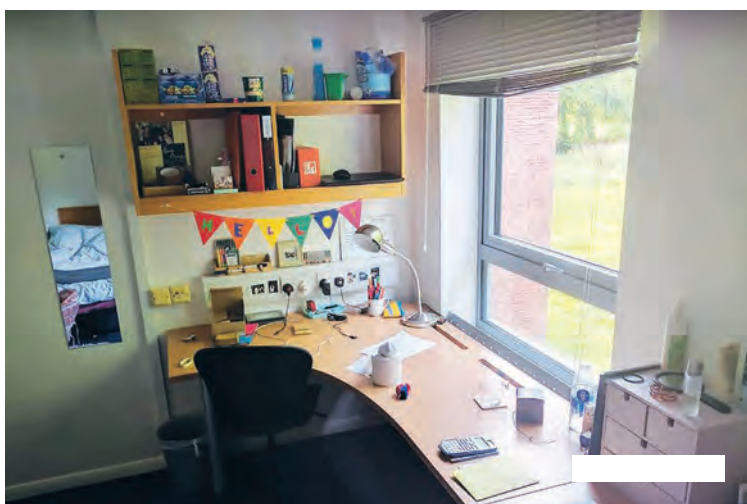

confident in coming here. My advice is no matter how big or small your worries are, it is always better to go and ask for help before everything worsens, and this is something the University really encourages.

At Birmingham, we're committed to raising aspirations, improving motivation and encouraging students from all backgrounds to consider university.

Our Pathways to Birmingham (P2B) programmes support Year 12 and 13 students with their progression to university and beyond. Each Pathways programme (including Access to Birmingham or A2B) offers a valuable experience and provides students with an insight into university study, the application process and graduate employability.

Upon successful completion of any Pathways programme, students will be eligible for an alternative offer (up to two grades below the prospectus offer) and financial support.



I applied to Birmingham through A2B. It was such a massive help knowing that I had some leeway with my grades. When I got my results, I had actually achieved the standard entry grades, so I was also eligible for the A2B scholarship, which was a lot of help financially.

I visited the University of Birmingham at the A2B launch event. Visiting the University gave me a taste of how university life can be. My favourite part was meeting so many new people. Through A2B, university also seemed a lot more achievable. Meeting new people and learning new things about Birmingham and what university would be like through A2B made the transition much easier.

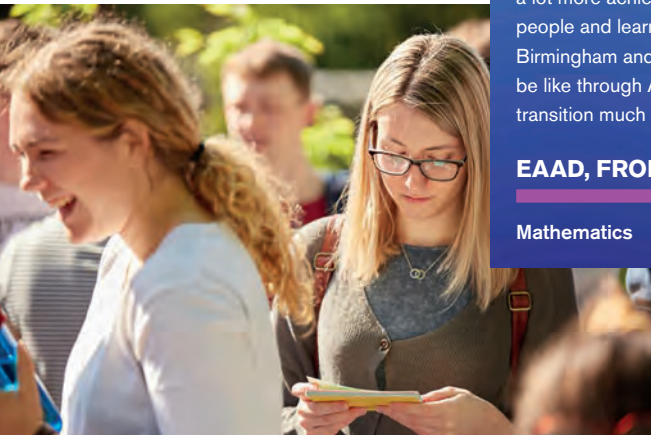

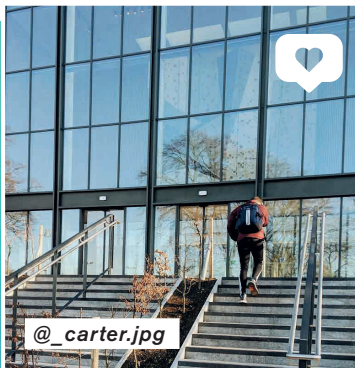

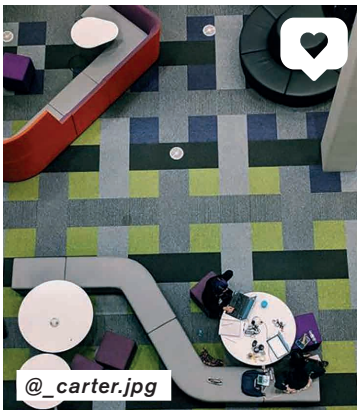

However, for programmes that interview as part of the selection process or that are very competitive, the consideration process will take longer. ENTRY

REQUIREMENTS

To be considered by Birmingham, you will need to meet the University's general entry requirements as well as the specific entry requirements of your chosen programme.

YOUR BIRMINGHAM OFFER

The type of offer you receive from Birmingham is personal to you depending on a range of factors, including your GCSE results, the subjects you're studying and other qualifications, your predicted grades, your personal statement, your reference and your personal circumstances.

The best way to find out what Your Birmingham Offer might be is to complete our Offer Calculator on our website. This tells you whether you are likely to receive an offer for a particular course, and the type of offer you can expect, based on the grades you have achieved and expect to achieve. This will help you to make an informed decision about whether that course is the right one for you.

CONTEXTUAL OFFERS

Our Contextual Offer scheme is an alternative route to undergraduate study for talented students, and recognises the potential of students whose personal circumstances may have restricted achievement at school or college. If you are eligible to benefit from our Contextual Offer scheme, you will receive an offer that is one grade lower than the typical offer.

PATHWAYS TO BIRMINGHAM

If you are eligible for, and successfully complete one of our Year 12 or 13 Pathways programmes, you will receive an alternative entry offer. This is normally two A level grades (or equivalent) below the standard offer.

EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION (EPQ)

Applicants who offer the EPQ and meet our offer criteria will be made the standard offer for their programme of choice, and an alternative offer which will be one grade lower plus a grade A in the EPQ (with the exception of our Medicine (A100) and

Dentistry (A200) programmes). For example, where our standard offer is AAA, the offer would be AAA or AAB plus A in the EPQ. We believe that this recognises the importance of independent learning and the value of this qualification as preparation for higher education.

GENERAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

We require a minimum of three A levels (or equivalent from other accepted qualifications) and GCSE grade C/4 in Mathematics and English. Please note that some programmes will have higher requirements than this minimum standard. We also consider other level 3 qualifications such as the International Baccalaureate, BTECs, the Welsh Baccalaureate, Scottish Highers and the Cambridge Pre-U. Typical offers for A level and IB, as well as any required subjects, are listed on our course pages – please always check online for the most up-to-date and detailed information.

KEY ADMISSIONS POLICIES

International Baccalaureate (IB)

Our policy on the IB qualification is focused on attainment in the Higher Level subjects. Therefore, offers are based on three Higher Level grades with a minimum overall mark of 32. (Note that this excludes Liberal Arts and Natural Sciences – see page 47).

BTECs

Many programmes will be happy to accept the BTEC Extended Diploma qualification, and combinations of BTECs and A levels, providing that any subject-specific requirements are met. Not all of our programmes will accept BTEC qualifications alone for entry. Please check the relevant course finder page on our website for detailed programme requirements.

Access to HE

Access to HE qualifications will be considered by some programmes. However, this is usually on a case-by-case basis – check our online course finder for more information.

Applicants returning to education

We welcome applications from people who have been out of education for some time and who may not meet the standard programme entry requirements. We encourage such applicants to contact the relevant admissions tutor in the first instance to discuss the suitability of your qualifications and experience.

Special requirements

For some programmes in medical and health sciences or where there is contact with vulnerable adults or children, a full Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check is required. You may also be required to sign a Code of Professional Conduct and meet Fitness to Practise requirements. Some programmes may also require certain immunisations and a health declaration.

QUALIFICATION REFORM

A levels

We treat all A levels equally and, therefore, will not differentiate between reformed linear and modular A levels in terms of grades required. However, please note that where a separate pass/fail mark is awarded in the reformed Science A levels, we will ask for the overall grade plus a pass in the practical for entry to our Science and Engineering degrees.

GCSEs

Applicants who offer reformed GCSEs will be asked for the following grade equivalence: A* = 8, A = 7, B = 6, C = 4.

BTECs

Acceptability of BTEC qualifications, including reformed BTECs, varies from programme to programme – please check online for further information.

COST OF LIVING

What does it cost to live in Birmingham? Money can often be a worry to students applying to university and while they're here – but there are lots of things you can do to keep your costs down.



On a typical night out, I tend to spend around £20. However, this certainly varies. There is such diverse nightlife in Birmingham and this comes with varying prices!

I have found the cost of living here to be very reasonable. Transport, food and accommodation are all very accessible to students. To add, I have found Birmingham to be a very student-friendly city: both socially and cost-wise. I always do my food shopping in Aldi as I prefer to cook for myself rather than go out for food. 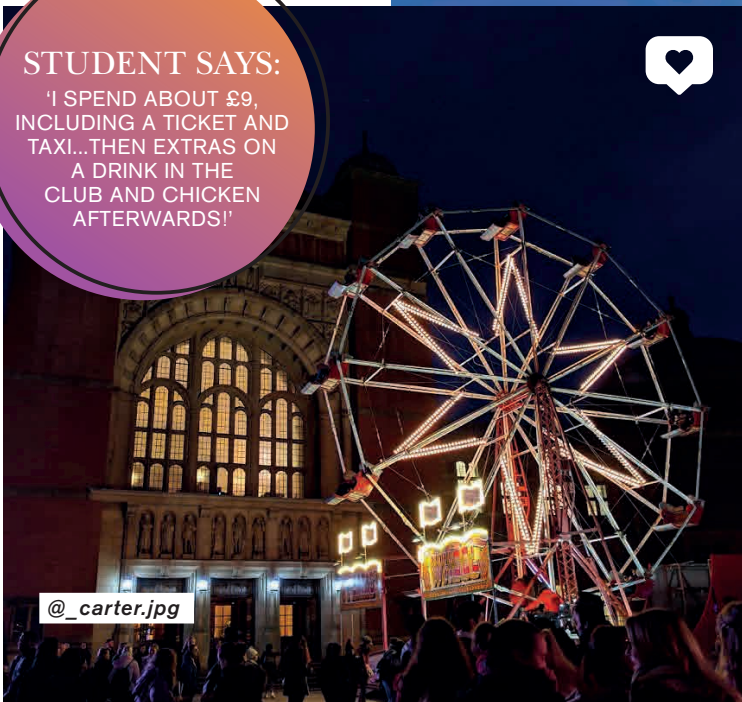
